COVID-19 IMELINE



JANUARY TO MARCH 2020

Malaysia detected its first three COVID-19 cases on Jan 25, 2020 - three Chinese nationals from Wuhan who entered the country from Singapore. The tabligh cluster resulted in a spike in infections nationwide.

MID MARCH TO AUGUST 2020

Movement control order (MCO 1.0) in mid-March, closing its borders and banning interstate travel. Daily number of cases sank to single-digit figures in July and August. By the end of August, Malaysia had less than 10,000 cumulative cases, one of the lowest in the region.

SEPTEMBER 2020 : SABAH STATE ELECTION

After the state polls, cases spiked and eventually hovered at four-digit figures daily. Number of cumulative cases in Sabah, which was 808 on nomination day on Sept 12, jumped by 91.5 per cent to 1,547 cases on polling day on Sept 26. On Oct 24, Sabah's cumulative cases were 11,285.

2021: STATE OF EMERGENCY, MCO 2.0

On Jan 12, with the national tally surpassing 138,000 and the healthcare system said to be at a breaking point, Malaysia's king proclaimed a state of emergency until Aug 1. All states, except for Sarawak, were placed under MCO (MCO 2.0).

END OF 2021 AND EARLY 2022

On 3 December, Malaysia reported its first case of the Omicron variant (a foreign student who had returned from visiting her family in South Africa). On 18 December, 11 new cases of the Omicron variant were confirmed, all resulting from overseas travel. On 22 December, the number of active cases dropped below the 50,000 threshold, reaching 49,395. A total of 22,878,955 adults or 97.7% of the country's adult population have completed their Covid-19 vaccination as of Friday (Jan 7 2022).

AUGUST 2021 TO DECEMBER 2021

August 2021 has been the worst month ever for Malaysia since the Covid-19 pandemic hit the country last year, despite having one of the fastest vaccination rates in the world.


A record total of 632,982 new infections were detected throughout the month, as daily cases regularly came in above 20,000 since it breached that mark for the first time on Aug 5 with 20,596 infections and hit an al 1-time high of 24,599 cases on Aug 26. Over time, the cases reduced with sudden rises and eventually there were 3,108 new cases on 19th December.

MID JUNE TO AUGUST 2021


The first phase of the lockdown was scheduled to last from Jun 1 to Jun 14. However, as daily case numbers still exceeded 5,000, the lockdown was extended for two weeks from Jun 15 until Jun 28. An enhanced movement control order (EMCO) was implemented in many parts of Selangor and Kuala Lumpur for a period of 14 days from Jul 3 to Jul 16.On Aug 6, Malaysia reported 20,889 new COVID-19 cases.

FEB TO JUNE 2021: VACCINATION DRIVE KICKS OFF + MCO 3.0


In February , Malaysia kicked off the national COVID-19 immunisation programme. Even with MCO 2.0 in place, the number of cases continued to surge, reaching an all-time high of 5,728 daily on Jan 30. On May 10, the government announced another nationwide MCO (MCO 3.0) from May 12 until June 7.




TECH SAVINESS

Independent individual learning and collaborative team learning, as well as practical sessions that provide opportunities to interact with industry and gain hands-on experience.


Creative, critical thinking and problem solving skills.
