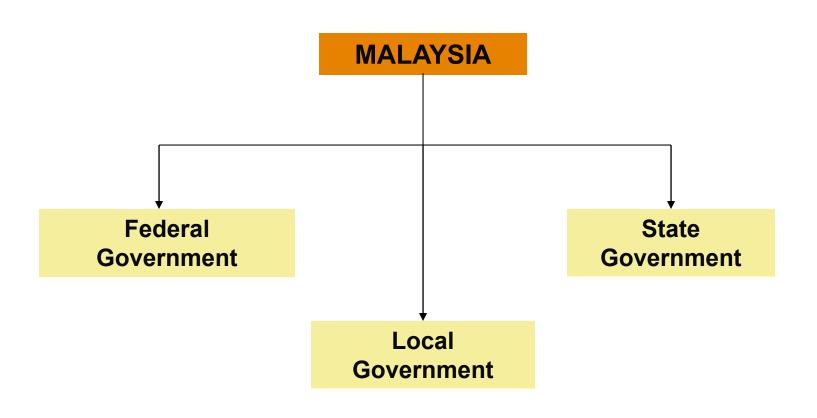
Introduction

- Malaysia is a federation country.
 - Federalism is a method of dividing power between two levels of governments – the federal and the state governments.
 - Both governments' roles and authority are clearly divided by the constitution and can be seen in the Federal list, State list and Common list

Main features of Federalism

- Division of power based on the written constitution.
- b. The **authority of a government is supreme** in at least one or more areas that are assigned to it.
- c. Both levels of government have **direct relations** with its citizens.
- Either level of government cannot change this constitutional relationship (or arrangement) by itself.
- Each government exists on its own rights and authority.

Concept of Separation of Power

- oThis separation is also known as the doctrine of separation of power
- The doctrine was firstly introduced by a famous French philosopher named Montesqiu in the 18th century

Structure of Federal Government

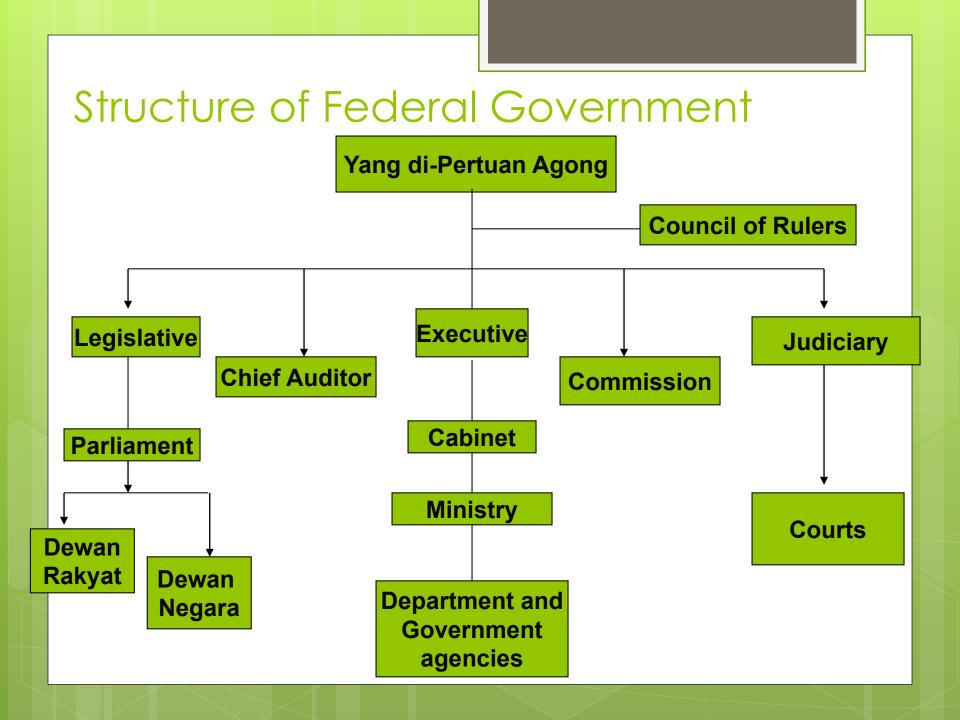
Concept of Separation of Power

- 3 main bodies in the administration:
- 1. the executive
 - has the rights to govern and administer the country and cannot make law and do judiciary power
- 2. the legislative
 - o to make laws
- 3. the judiciary
 - has the authority to implement the power of judiciary and not the others

Structure of Federal Government

Concept of Separation of Power

- to avoid any complot between the bodies
- to guarantee the people's freedom
- to prevent abuse of power by the ruling power
- no occurrence of centralization of power among the three bodies
- to provide check and balance in the country's government system



- Has the power to govern.
- Responsible for carrying out the matters of governing and administrating.
- Has the role of implementing the laws that have been passed by the legislative body.

- Article 39 mentioned that the executive power is in the hands of YDPA. However, His Highness has to act on the advice of the cabinet or usually the PM.
- YDPA has the right to obtain all information regarding the administration of the country from the Cabinet

The Cabinet

- o The executive power is basically exercised by the cabinet in the name of Yang di-Pertuan Agong (YDPA).
- o It is made up of those who represent the party with a majority in the Parliament (Dewan Rakyat), which is decided by a general election process

The Cabinet

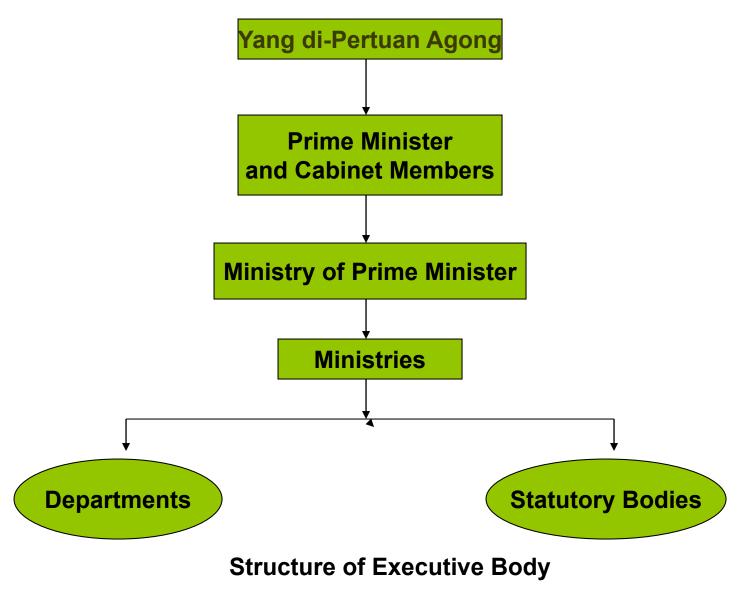
- Headed by a PM and the ministers as its members.
- The ministers are appointed by YDPA upon the advice of the PM.
- The PM is the head of the government.
- He is assisted by Deputy PM and some Cabinet Ministers

The Cabinet

- Weekly meeting.
- collective discussion & decision
 - it is also collectively responsible to Parliament

The function of the Cabinet is to:

- i. make and legislate the government policies
- ii. determine the country policies
- iii. issue directives for their implementation by the government administrative machinery at both Federal and State levels.
- iv. act as advisory body to YDPA



- This is the body that makes law.
- Parliament is the legislative authority for the Federation
 - it makes laws applicable to the Federation as a whole
 - wields a considerable and far-reaching influence on the life of the Federation

Role of the Parliament:

- passes federal laws
- makes amendments to existing federal laws
- examines the government's policies
- approves the government's expenditures
- approves new taxes
- serves as the forum for criticism and the focus of public opinion on national affairs
- to pass national budget for any fiscal year

YDPA

- not involved in making laws
- 2. to call, to stop and to dissolve Parliament
- 3. to put into laws bills that have been passed
- 4. to appoint Senator / member of senate in accordance to the PM's advice

House of Senate (Dewan Negara)

- consists of 70 members.
- o made up of 2 categories:
 - 1. **26 members** elected by the **State Legislative Assembly** to represent **13 states** (each state represented by 2 members).
 - 2. 44 members appointed by YDPA on the advice of the Prime Minister, including 2 members from the Federal Territory of Kuala Lumpur, and 1 member each from the Federal Territory of Labuan and Putrajaya

House of Senate (Dewan Negara)

- be a Malaysian citizen;
- be not less than 30 years old;
- 3. be of sound mind;
- not be an undercharged bankrupt;
- don't have a criminal record

House of Representative (Dewan Rakyat)

- has 219 elected members.
- Most important Dewan or House because its members are elected by the people.
- A General Election is held every 5 years to elect members of the Dewan Rakyat.
- Parties with the most votes can form a government to rule the country

House of Representative (Dewan Rakyat)

- be a Malaysian citizen;
- ii. be not less than 21 years old;
- iii. be of sound mind;
- iv. not be an undercharged of bankruptcy; and
- v. don't have a criminal record

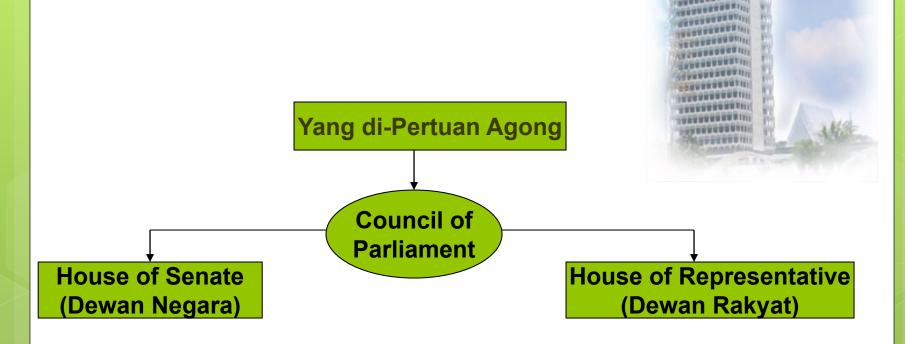
- Customarily, a **Bill originates in the Dewan Rakyat.** Once **approved**, it is tabled in the **Dewan Negara for another debate**. After that,
 the **Bill has to be approved** before being **presented to YDPA for his consent**.
- The Bill will then be gazette in the form of 'Government Gazette', thus making the Bill a law as stated in the Government Gazette

The Process of Enactment of Laws

Drafting the Bill (Proposal stage)	A minister concerned drafts the bill to be introduced, usually consult the Attorney General's Chamber, then brings up the proposed bill into the Cabinet meeting to get feedback and endorsement. Secure the cabinet's agreement, the minister will then inform the Secretaries of both Houses who will order the Bill be printed and circulated among members of both houses of Parliament.
First Reading	The minister for the first time will introduce/read the Bill to the Dewan Rakyat
Second Reading	The Bill will be debated by discussing the general principles and its influence and implications to the people and the country.
House Committee	The Bill will be discussed in detail, review and amended by the House Select Committee
Third reading	The Bill will be debated again with amendments at the level of the Committee stage, vote will be done two times before it is passed by the Dewan Rakyat .

The Process of Enactment of Laws

Motion of Bill (Dewan Negara)	The Bill passed in the Dewan Rakyat will be sent to the Dewan Negara for approval and will go through the same process and procedure.
Royal Assent / Approval	The passed Bill is presented to the YDPA to be approved and stamped with Royal Seal
Gazette	The Bill is announced to the public through the government gazette before it can be implemented.



Structure of Legislative body

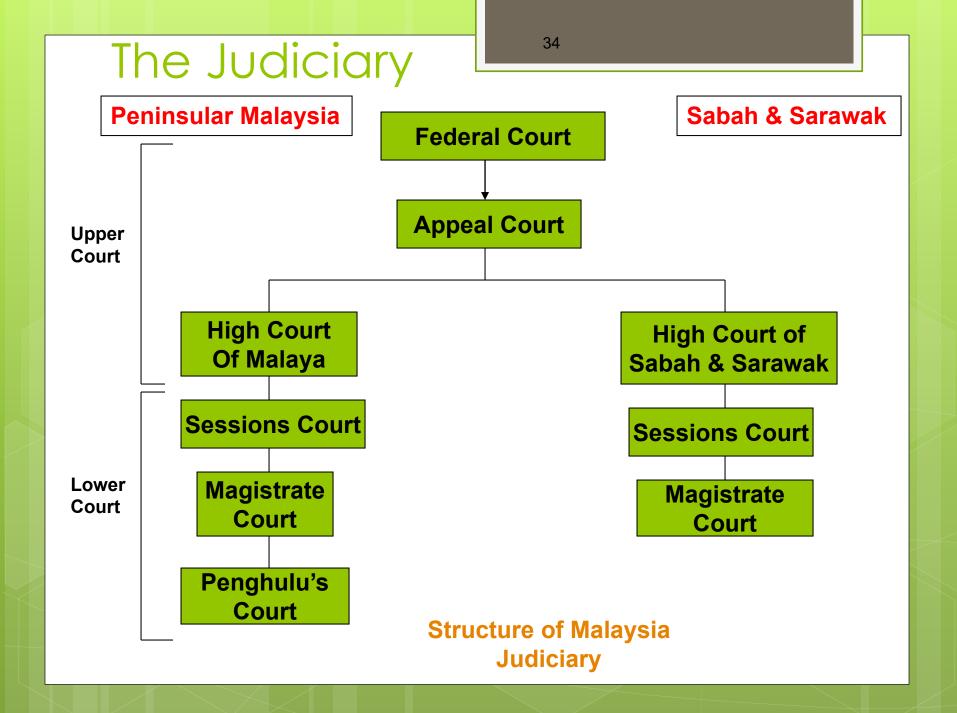
- o responsible for the **process of justice** to be enforced in the country. The duty is **carried out in the courts of law.**
- Compared to Legislature and Executive, Judiciary has wider power.
- The Federal Court of Malaysia is the highest judicial authority and the final court of appeal in Malaysia

- Basic role:
 - o to **defend justice** for **everyone** regardless of the status, special rights, colour, political ideology, religion, size of organization or its influence.
- The body is guided by the Constitution itself

- According to Tun Mohammad Suffian, the courts have 4 areas of jurisdiction:
 - i. The power to interpret the Constitution
 - ii. The power to **interpret the law**
 - iii. The power to **proclaim a written Federal** or **state** law invalid
 - iv. The power to declare a government action as invalid in the eyes of the law

- Judge is appointed by the YDPA on the advice of the PM, after consultation with the Council of Rulers.
- Head of Judge is called Chief Justice.

- Attorney General is the government legal advisor.
- Judiciary Service Commission
 - handle judiciary matters such as appointment,
 promotion and allowances of legal officers



Types of Courts and their Duties

Federal Court	 Consists of the Chief Justice of FC, the Chief Justice of HC, 4 judges and a member of additional judges. Decides on the validity of laws made in Parliament or State Legislature Decides on dispute between Federal & State governments. Decides on dispute between 2 states Deliberates on appeals of civil and criminal cases from the HC Advises the YDPA on the Constitution
Appeal Court	 Comprises the President of the AC, and 10 other judges Decides on appeals of civil and criminal cases from the HC For appeal on civil cases, the amount involve should not less than RM250,000.00 The court does not have any original jurisdiction
High Court	 Headed by the Chief Judge of the HC Generally, the HC has the jurisdiction to hear cases which carry death sentence The HC has the jurisdiction to hear civil and criminal cases Hear and decides on appeal of civil and criminal cases from MC and SC To observe and check all decisions of civil and criminal cases of the LC

Types of Courts and their Duties

Sessions Court	 Headed by a Sessions Court Judge Hears all criminal offences except those related with death Can impose jail sentences, fine & whipping befitting the offence committed, as permitted by the law Hears civil cases where the amount disputed not exceed RM250,00.00 Hear civil cases on landlord and tenant
Magistrate Court	 Headed by a Magistrate Hears light criminal and civil cases where the maximum imprisonment does not exceed 10 years or punishable by fine only Hears claims for repayment of debts in the monetary form Can impose caning for criminal cases
Penghulu's Court	 Headed by the Penghulu or Head of the Mukim (Peninsular M'sia) Examines light criminal cases (not exceed RM25) Examines civil cases (not exceed RM50)

Special Courts

- o formed for specific purposes
- Usually it is a close court (except Syariah Court).

Special Courts

There are 6 types of Special Courts:

- Special Court of Rulers
- 2. Juvenile Court
- 3. Syariah Court
- 4. Court Martial
- 5. Bumiputera Court (deals with customs of the indigenous people of Sabah & Sarawak)
- 6. Industrial Court

Local Government

- under the authority of state government
 - its administration is under the control of fed.
 government through the Ministry of Housing
 Local Government.
- Responsible to provide town services to specified areas

- 1. Town (urban)
- 2. Annual Income

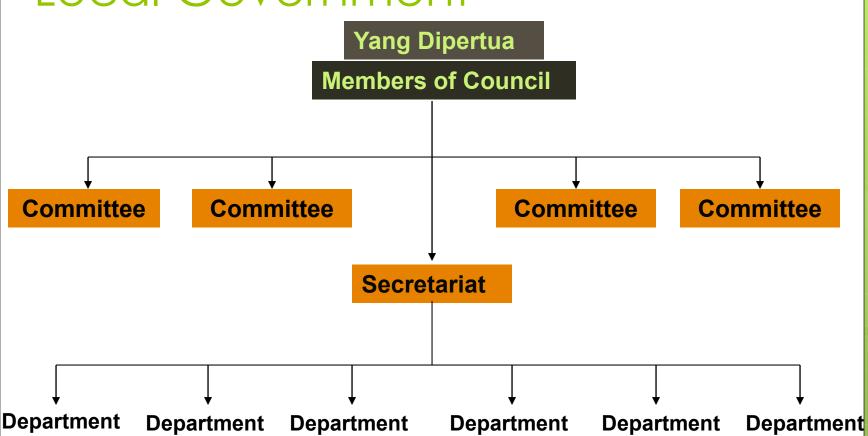
RM 5 m
